CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The College under instruction of the affiliating university, The University of Burdwan, has introduced the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) from the academic session 2017-18 with the following aspects: (i) Each of the departments has the discretion to offer the choice able courses and maximum number of courses has been offered. (ii) Orientation programmes are arranged for all the newly admitted students at the beginning of the course. (iii) Each of the departments has prepared its own lesson plans following the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university. (iv) Three separate but synchronised (on the basis of available classrooms) master routines for B.A. (Honours & General), B.Sc. (Honours & General) and B.Com (Honours & General) have been prepared by the Routine Committee (the committee has been formed in the Teachers' Council). Each of the departments has fitted their classes following the master routines and allotted specialised teachers for each paper. (v) Sufficient number of practical classes have been allotted for each papers for the lab based subjects. Laboratories have also been upgraded and made well equipped with the financial aid under RUSA 2.0. (vi) Sufficient number books (following the list of bibliography provided with the affiliating university prescribed curriculum) have been purchased with partial financial assistance from RUSA 2.0. (vii) The departments conduct regular internal assessment tests, give home assignments to the students, internally assess the final semester (SEM VI) students by making them deliver seminar lectures through power point presentation and keep the students updated about their disciplines through invited lectures. (viii) The departments, to some extent, trying to use ICT which gives students a better understanding and extended knowledge of their disciplines. Study materials are also provided to the students. (ix) The college has emphasised on the area of environmental issues for which a subject coordinator has been appointed to control and monitor all the project works and theory classes very systematically and meticulously where 20 to 25 teachers are involved. (x) Students are also encouraged to present papers on non-curricular areas. (xi) The students regularly participate in extracurricular activities such as Mock Parliament Competitions, Science Model Competition, Quiz Competition, Inter College Football and Athletics Competition, Debate and Extempore Competitions all organized by the State Government.

Collection of data for feedback is a continuous process. Feedback are taken from the stakeholders from time to time and in different methods. During the academic year 2018-19 structured feedback were taken from students and parents. The Students' Feedback is an integral part of development planning of any academic institution. In this study students were to assess overall functioning of the college. This process does not only help the college authority to identify the strong and weak points of the institution but also encourages students to take active part in the development process of the college. In this process students were to review teachers' performance. A questionnaire was prepared for collecting students' feedback taking into consideration of the changes occurred in the academic structure particularly due to introduction of CBCS in 2017-18. Questionnaires were distributed among final year Honors students. Sixteen aspects were identified for survey. Students have to mark each aspect in 5 point scale. Number of respondent was 203. The detail report is uploaded in the website. Feedback from parents is taken in various ways throughout the year particularly in time of Parent-Teacher meeting at Department Level as well as institutional level. The aspects discussed during the meetings and observations of teachers and staff in general a questionnaire was set and randomly served among 78 parents/guardians whose wards are studying this college at least for one year. All are requested to submit the filled up formats at the college office. As most of the respondents are not comfortable with English questionnaire was translated to Bengali. Some of the respondents could not read or write, they were allowed to take help of their wards. Four filled up forms were found defective and had to be rejected. Finally, the Study was made on the basis of response of 74 parents. The detail report is uploaded in the website. After the compilation of data it became clear that options of students and parents are similar though those are not the same. We have to consider the fact that many of the parents do not have formal education. So we gave greater attention to address the students' feedback report. Apart from this without feedback from teachers and staff educational institute cannot properly function. All the matters related to academics were discussed and decisions were taken in the meetings of Academic sub-committee, Teachers Council and in the meetings of IQAC with the Teaching and Non Teaching Staff. Feedback from the college authority is also an important component for overall development which comes through the Principal and the members of the Governing Body.

2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Our institution is affiliated to The University of Burdwan and hence we strictly follow the curriculum designed by this University. Keeping in mind the necessity of continuous assessment, University Grants Commission (UGC) issued relevant order for implementing CBCS (Choice based credit system) system in all Universities and institutions in our country. Our University has adopted this new system and immediately replaced existing (111) pattern from 201718 session. In this newly implemented system continuous internal evaluation (CIE) gets prior importance and hence each paper (except SEC DSE) of the curriculum, internal assessment has been made mandatory. Evaluations are done on the basis of students' activity and performances on written exams, assignments, student seminar, practical experiments etc. throughout their courses. Since this system is directly related to students' attendance, students are very much concern about their attendance and hence students' attendance is regularly increasing which makes the pavement for securing good result.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Every year at the start of an academic session we prepare academic calendar and upload in our college website. It is one of the regular practices of our institution. This is to be mentioned that our University (The University of Burdwan) prepares academic calendar every year including tentative date of different examination. Our institute incorporates some institutional related data such as schedule of Internal assessment/Test examination, date of publication of wall magazine, date of departmental seminar, date of annual sport etc. in the academic calendar prepared by the University not altering basic skeleton of the calendar.

Strategy Type	Details
Curriculum Development	The College is an affiliated college and it has little scope to develop curriculum independently of its own rather it implements the curriculum designed and developed by the affiliating University. However, the teachers of the college of many departments are members of (under graduate) Board of Studies of the University where they get the scope to contribute in developing and shaping the final form of curriculum that are taught in the college. The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) pattern of curriculum has been introduced from the academic session 201718.
Teaching and Learning	The teaching and learning process in the college has been largely rescheduled and geared up with the introduction of CBCS system. In this system each class is of one hour duration (Practical class is of two hours) and the number of classes for each credit has been arranged as required by the CBCs system. But each of the departments has prepared its own teaching plans and lecture schedules and supplements the prescribed syllabi with additional inputs for knowledge formation. The departments also conduct regular internal assessment tests, and

	<pre>keep students updated about their disciplines through invited lectures. The departments also use ICT which gives students a better understanding and extended knowledge of their disciplines. Students are also encouraged to present papers on curricular and noncurricular areas. The college is also emphatic about regular attendance of classes by students, and award marks for attendance accordingly. The same pattern of teachinglearning method is followed for P.G students of Bengali department which was introduced in the academic session 201819.</pre>
Examination and Evaluation	The whole schedule of examinations is earnestly implemented by the college as per direction of the University. The students of this college are to take seats for their endsemester examinations in other college as decided by the University. The evaluation programme is also fixed by the University where the answer scripts of our students are evaluated by the teachers of other colleges and teachers of this college evaluate the other scripts of the students of other colleges as assigned by the University. However, within a fixed timeframe the internal assessments of the students of the college are conducted and evaluated by the college teachers.
Research and Development	While many of the teachers are engaged in conducting research for their doctoral degrees, many others involved in academic research and experiments for writing and publishing research papers. Few teachers are also supervising works of research scholars for consideration of doctoral degree under the University of Burdwan.
Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation	The College has procured and is in the process of procuring books worth Rupees ten lakhs with funds under RUSA 2.0. The college also subscribes to a number of disciplinespecific academic journals as well as to a number of magazines of general and current importance and newspapers (including those carrying information on employment) on a regular basis. In addition the college also is a member of the INFLIBNET, the online research journal facility. Teachers and research scholars of the college enjoy remote access facility. The library is now equipped with an computerbased

	books and journals search mechanism called KOHA. The college has a virtual (Smart) classroom where teachers conduct classes and students take the opportunity of availing ICT facilities in their studies. With funds under RUSA 2.0, the college has procured computers, laboratory equipment, sports and gymnasium items, items for campus development. The science laboratories have been renovated, improved and upgraded. The new and additional equipments are under process of installation, and these have enhanced the infrastructural and instrumentation capacity. The college is also in the process of imparting English language enhancement skill through a language laboratory.
Human Resource Management	While the management taps the potential of all employees and students, it attempts to ensure all benefits incumbent upon them. The Students' grievance cell redresses grievances of students, while the Women's Cell (Vishaka) is in place to address any reported case of sexual harassment within the college premises. The college also, out of its own resources, funds the participation of students in sporting and other activities organized at the university or the district or state levels. The college has subscribed to an insurance health scheme for students who would be entitled to free medical treatment in a hospital up to one lakh following any accident. The college encourages participation of faculty members in seminars/symposia/conferences and in OPs and RCs at the national and international levels by granting them leave. The college also arranges regular screening for promotion of teachers under CAS.

As a part of Govt. programme, "West Bengal Renewable Energy Development Agency", a Govt. of West Bengal agency took the initiative to install 5kW watt power generating solar panels, covering an area of around 1600 square foot on the roof top of the second floor of the south building of Bolpur College, which is directly connected to the power supply grid. The power thus generated is consumed by the institution owing to a lesser amount of electric bill payment. In the holidays also, this power generation will continue and the excess power, if any, would be consumed by the power grid. This is also adjusted with the electric bill of the college. As per electric bill of session 20182019, there is a savings of approximately 30 of expenditure in this head.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

(i) In order to build up a plastic free zone throughout the campus the total camps has been declared free by installing hoardings and signboards with the help of NSS unit1 and unit2. (ii) Installation of solar panels in order to switch towards use of non conventional energy sources as described in column 7.1.2. (iii) Installation of compost machine in order to produce biofertilizer from biological wastes. (iv) Plantation programmes done every year during the months of August September as a part of "Vriksharopan Utsava" (aforestation ceremony). (v) Plantation of medicinal plants in the college garden. (vi)
Taking measures to solid waste management by prevention of improper disposal of laboratory wastes and plant wastes produced inside the campus. As a part of this programme, Bolpur College took the first initiatives to make the campus completely free of plastics in 2014. In this context the two units of NSS (NSS Unit1 and NSS Unit1] has been successfully working on it since 2015 and the session 201819 is also not an exception. (vii) Planning for rainwater harvesting is underway.

BEST PRACTICE I 1. Title of the Practice Staff Welfare: Financial Assistance to Teaching and Nonteaching Staff Members 2. Objectives of the Practice Financial assistance is a primary and basic need of every human being in the society, without the aid of which no one can construct his/her future plans such as raising their wards and having a good shelter in the form of house or residence, and off course in the time of emergency, particularly for treatment purposes, immediate financial assistance is a prerequisite factor. In this context The Bolpur College Employee's Cooperative Credit Society Ltd. has the objectives to provide our employees, (i) Immediate loan within as much as shortest period at a reasonable interest rate. (ii) An extra financial benefit by providing dividend from their share money. (iii) A recurring and non refundable savings scheme where the employee can get back his/her money with compound interest immediately after his/her retirement even before enjoying the pension or gratuity. (iv) A good practice of keeping a cordial relationship and healthy ambience among the employees through the platform of the society. 3. The Context The Bolpur College Employee's Cooperative Credit Society Ltd. started its journey in the year 1968. The society was registered in the Office of the A.R.C.S., Birbhum on 22.11.1968 as a Primary Credit Cooperative Society under the provision of the W. B. C. S. Act, 1983. The society comprises the permanent as well as the contractual teaching and non teaching staff members of Bolpur College as its members. The society is managed by a board consisting of 12 members of directors who are elected in the AGM. 4. The Practice The society has constructed a separate office room at its own expenditure in the space provided by the college authority (with prior permission) for its operation. The society is currently running the following schemes, (i) Short term (ST) loan up to Rs.1,00,000/- @ 9.5 interest per annum. (ii) Middle term (MT) loan up to Rs.3,00,000/- @ 10 interest per annum. (iii) Long term (LT) loan up to Rs.8,00,000/- @ 10.5 interest per annum. (iv) Providing dividend @ 10 per annum

(this rate is flexible) on the share money that are deducted at the time of sanctioning ST, MT and LT Loans @ 5 on the sum of loaned amount. (v) Monthly non refundable recurring deposit scheme on 'Thrift Fund" at instalment of Rs.2,000/- to Rs.5,000/- per month. This sum is returned with 10 compound interest either after retirement of the incumbent or in case if he/she resigns from the membership of the society. All types of the schemes above are helpful for the members of the society for, (i) Immediate treatment purpose, (ii) Raising their wards and providing them higher education, and (iii) Having immediate and hassle free house building loan with minimum papers along with the tax benefit facility. Apart from the schemes, a token gift is given to all the members from the annual profit of the society. The Annual General Meeting (AGM) is held at the end of every calendar year where the election of the Board of Directors is also held in every five years. The meeting of the Board of Directors is held at a regular interval (10-12 meetings per year). The society is well concerned about a healthy ambience and cordial relationship among all the staff members of the college for what a lunch party is arranged every year on the date of AGM. 5. Evidence of success (i) The society has been classified under 'A' Category for the last four consecutive years for its stable financial performance. Total turnover in the form of loans of the society stood at Rs.1.68 crore for the financial year ended on 31.03.2019 as per audited report for the year 2018-2019. Paid up share capital and working capital of the society stood at Rs.14,76,985/- and Rs.1.71 crore respectively as on 31.03.2019. There is no bad loans or non performing assets in the loan portfolio in spite of limited liability of the members. It should be worth mentioning that all over in India, almost all nationalized banks are plagued with huge bad loans or NPAs. The society also got first prize among the Non-Govt. primary credit societies in the district of Birbhum in the year 2018. (ii) Statutory Audit including Tax Audit is up to date. Tax return file is submitted through C/A Farm. (iii) Three salaried employees are also working in the society, that means, job opportunity has also been created by the society. 6. Problems encountered The society is trying to, (i) The society is yet to reopen it's Fixed Deposit savings scheme. (ii) Overall computerisation of the office by installing appropriate banking software for faster operation. 7. Others The overall system is financially transparent and gives the lesson of self reliance. The Practice The practice of publishing Wall Magazine is of immense importance in terms of encouraging the students to express their inherent potentialities in various field academic, literary, artistic and cultural spheres. Development of photographic skill is an added phenomenon. Department of Bengali and Philosophy publish their half yearly wall magazines Shaili Dishari since 2014 and 2015. Department of Chemistry named their wall magazine as Toxi- Talk as it is focused on pollution for the last five years. Department of English, Botany and Zoology publish yearly and they titled them according to the theme. Apart from these regular publications Department of Geography (Dew Drop), Department of Economics (Beekshan), Department of Mathematics and Commerce have also published wall magazines. Students with some guidance from faculty members collected information, prepared the texts for these magazines. They decorated them with their paintings and photography and gave them final shape. It is a complete group activity. Evidence of success The evidence of success related to the publication of Wall Magazines demands attention. The student-writers get

required impetous to continue writing in the various fields they are attached to. They grew ambitious to see their writing or papers in the magazines or journals. Inquisitiveness developed through this activity transfuses to class rooms also. Some of the departments are planning to exhibit their old wall magazines. Problems encountered Most of the students remain preoccupied with their carrier building. And present syllabus and curricula give them little time to carry on any other activities including publication of Wall Magazines. Others None.
